Many *Enlisted* members believe that AFA is an "Officers Association". In 1947, our first president, Jimmy Doolittle, said "Generals, colonels, second lieutenants, top kicks, and buck privates are all just plain 'Mister' in AFA. While I have been elected to head up AFA, Meryll Frost, ex-Sgt, is a vice president and John Biehn, a former private, is one of the directors". Jimmy Doolittle could very well make a similar statement today. In short, AFA is an organization for *all* Air Force personnel. Everyone is needed and welcome!

AFA's basic mission is focused on national defense. With this as one of the main tasks, AFA strives to deal with matters pertaining to all Air Force personnel. Specifically, AFA has proven to be a strong voice for Air Force members at the Pentagon and Capitol Hill. Through its monthly publication *Air Force Magazine*, and numerous symposia and seminars, AFA has brought the concerns of *Enlisted* members into the public eye.

Many Air Force people (including present and former *Enlisted* members) have and continue to make valuable contributions, often in leadership positions allowing them to know the needs, concerns and aspirations of Air Force people not only throughout the continental United States but overseas as well.

The enlisted help develop annual policy and guidance for our association by serving in key positions. They also provide input through the Air Force *Enlisted Advisory Council*. This council meets several times during the year to hammer out issues of particular concern to the Enlisted men and women of the Air Force. These issues then are addressed in our Annual Statement of Policy and Top Issues.

- So that we may recognize the best of the best, AFA honors the outstanding achievements of men and women throughout the United States Air Force, government, academia and the aerospace industry with awards, fellowships and scholarship programs. Nominations are solicited by the Air Force, members and leaders of AFA, and other organizations with a deep interest in aerospace activities. - In 2005, AIR FORCE launched its innovative, ground breaking "Daily Report" news product on the AFA website, opening a highly promising venture in the defense information field. It provides a daily (Monday through Friday) roundup of news about the Air Force, airpower, and national defense.
